
Summer is winding down as the District continues to upgrade outdated sewer infrastructure through our Capital Improvement Program, with project work now moving into the fall season. Making these improvements to our 120-year-old system is essential to help protect public health and the environment by reducing the risk of sewer spills. In addition to this work, we recently released our latest <u>informational video</u> on what to do if you see a sewer spill.



How to Respond to a Sanitary Sewer Overflow

A sanitary sewer overflow (SSO, or spill) occurs when a sanitary sewer system releases untreated raw sewage into the environment. SSOs can occur for multiple reasons. One reason is during a storm when an increased amount of water enters and overloads the sanitary sewer system. In addition, blockages and defects to the sewer system can increase the frequency of SSO events. Blockages happen when people use the toilet or sink as a trash can – throwing wipes, sanitary napkins, fats/oils/grease (FOG), floss and other non-degradable items into them. These items accumulate and block our older, smaller pipes. We also observe that plumbers and contractors sometimes send root wads and drain rock down into our system when clearing laterals, causing blockages that lead to spills. We encourage everyone to let us know when these things happen because we can respond right away,

free of charge, and clear these blockages before they cause a spill.



These types of overflow events contaminate our waterways, threatening public health and the environment. Calling us first will result in a faster response than any private company, possibly preventing a discharge to a creek!

If you believe you are witnessing a sewer spill outside your residence or in the public right of way (as shown in the photos above and to the right), it's essential to act fast and to call your local wastewater agency as soon as possible. Here at the District, we ensure a 24/7 response to any emergency call within our service area.

2021 Capital Improvement Projects Progress Report

Butterfield/Arroyo-Kenrick Gravity Sewer Improvements Project: Pipeline, lateral installation and sidewalk restoration are complete on Butterfield Road. Work began on Fawn Drive in mid-September and is scheduled to continue through October. Photo on the right shows crews working on Butterfield Rd in San Anselmo this summer. FY 2020/21 Gravity Sewer Improvements Project:Work on South Eliseo Drive, Corte Real and El Portal in Larkspur will continue into October. Work in Sequoia Park (San Anselmo) is scheduled to begin mid-October. Pipeline work on Rancheria Road and Laurel Way in Kent Woodlands is complete. Photo on the left shows summer work taking place on South Eliseo Drive in Larkspur. The entire project is scheduled to be completed in January, weather permitting. Larkspur Pump Stations 14, 24, & 25 Improvements Project: Construction is anticipated to begin this fall. Pump stations 24 and 25 are located on South Eliseo Drive. Station 14 is on Doherty Drive next to Hall Middle School. Visit the project <u>webpage</u> for updates and more information.


Ross Creek Sewer Removal Project

Construction is scheduled to begin on October 4. We received a \$20,190 grant from the <u>California Fish Passage Forum</u> in June and permits have been received from Regional Water Quality Control Board, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

This ecologically beneficial project will remove the concrete encased, 21-inch diameter abandoned sewer from the creek bed and replace it with an engineered "riffle" (or rapids) to improve steelhead trout migration to and from the ocean. New Common Laterals Webpage





District 2021 Infrastructure Asset Management Plan Update

RVSD staff recently updated the District's Infrastructure Asset Management Plan (IAMP), which prioritizes

future capital improvement projects based on a system-wide risk assessment. Most of the District's assets assessed during the IAMP update were determined to be moderate to low risk based on the various risk model calculations for each asset type (i.e., gravity sewers, manholes, pump stations, force mains, etc.).

The previous 2013 IAMP was required by the Cease and Desist Order from the Regional Water Quality Control Board. It guided the capital projects completed over several years which have reduced storm water infiltration and inflow (I&I), reduced sewer spills, increased capacity, and replaced pump station and pipeline infrastructure that had outlived its useful life. The updated plan will be posted online under <u>District Studies and Reports</u> when finalized.

Larkspur Landing

RVSD continues to wait for the U.S. EPA's official signoff of the site cleanup of the former wastewater treatment plant site at 2000 Larkspur Landing Circle, although informally they have indicated the site is clean and suitable for unrestricted use. Over the past year, the District has conducted a series of informational presentations relating to a potential surplus property disposition in the future. The previous informational presentations are posted on the RVSD <u>Larkspur Landing webpage</u>. We encourage our ratepayers to track and participate in this discussion as the Board weighs alternatives, and we will keep you informed about additional opportunities to provide input.

To provide the Board of Directors and the public with a recap of these meetings, the District will hold a special study session on Wednesday, October 13 at 5 p.m.
