Construction at RVSD is winding down as we approach the wet season.

We recently finished work on sewer rehabilitation projects in <u>Fairfax</u>, <u>Larkspur and San Anselmo</u> and improvements to the <u>Kentfield Pump Station 15</u> are almost complete.



The Butterfield Road portion of our <u>Butterfield/Meadowcroft-Arroyo</u> sewer improvements in San Anselmo is complete. Paving on Willow Way and concrete restoration on Meadowcroft Drive is anticipated to be complete in early November. Sewer improvements on <u>Lower Shady Lane/Poplar Avenue</u> are nearly complete, in time for the annual Halloween Parade.

Cleanup at our <u>Larkspur Landing site</u> is three-fourths complete, with all of the hazardous material now removed from the site. We have back-filled the excavated areas and are placing topsoil and hydro seeding for the winter, with plans to wrap up before Thanksgiving. The remaining one-fourth of the project is scheduled to be complete by summer 2020.

On October 16, the RVSD Board of Directors adopted Resolution No.19-1566 requesting the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo) initiate proceedings to annex the Murray Park Sewer Maintenance District (a "dependent" special district under the County) into RVSD, which would become effective on July 1, 2020 according to LAFCo's schedule.

At this hearing, the board also adopted Ordinance No. 91, the new Ordinance relating to Sewer Capacity Charges and Sewer Permit Fees. The capacity charges are based on

an updated valuation of the wastewater collection system as documented by the District's modernized asset management system. The permit fees are based on the cost of staff time to administer the programs. The new Ordinance repeals Ordinance 90, adopted on February 21, 2018.

Backup Power and the PG&E Planned Power Outage

During the recent PG&E power outage, Marin County residents were reminded of our dependency on a reliable power supply. After two or three days, we all found ways to "work around" not having electricity, requiring both preparation and responsiveness that became more challenging as the hours went by. Backup power is a way of life for wastewater collection and treatment systems. Our pumps must operate continuously to transport wastewater through Ross Valley to reach the treatment plant - and we too were tested by the duration of the outage.

Typical outages we experience last an hour or less, usually 15-30 min. The longest outage we've had in recent years lasted around four hours. This recent outage was in place for approximately 45 hours (8:30 pm Saturday to 6:00 pm Monday). Seven of our 19 pump stations have generators that automatically activate and power the pumps. Our 12 smaller lift stations require a few hours to check, switch on a portable generator and pump down, about twice a day. The City of Larkspur owns one of these generators and RVSD provides the fuel. Most of the generators have a diesel fuel tank that we ensured were "full" before the power outage. All were over half-full at the end.

These generators are combustion engines like those found in vehicles. Using this analogy, our regular use of them is roughly equivalent to a driver's commute time of about a half-hour - a typical length of time when we test them once per month, or during a short power outage. The recent extended outage can be compared to driving to the Empire State Building in New York City.

To return home, you would likely want to check the fuel, oil and coolant, etc. before hitting the road. Similarly, we checked our backup electrical and mechanical systems after the recent outage. While some maintenance issues were identified, nothing major was found.

Flows are lower during power outages because some sources of wastewater (such as washing machines, dishwashers and about half of all hot water heaters) are electricity-driven. With these electrical appliances out of operation, the wastewater flow is reduced to about half the normal flow, resulting in less fuel use and more time allowed between pump-downs at small lift stations.

We get calls from some residents and businesses (with sewer ejector pumps) that forget about them until the power is out for a while. RVSD does not provide pumping service for private sewer ejector pumps. This type of equipment is used in buildings where plumbing fixtures have been installed below the elevation of the public

sewer main. For residents or businesses with these devices where there is no backup power, contact information should be kept handy for a plumber or someone else you can call for assistance when the next power outage (planned or not) occurs.

We were well prepared for this planned event and are fine-tuning our operations for the next power outage, planned or unplanned. Communications with our JPA partners (San Rafael, Corte Madera and CMSA) went well throughout this event and contingency plans for refueling our generators were in place if the outage had continued longer. We also provided "mutual aid" assistance of personnel and equipment to Tamalpais Community Services District in Mill Valley. In Southern Marin the outage lasted for 71 hours (nearly 3 days). We most likely would have weathered that amount of time as well (equal to driving to Atlanta and back) which would take its toll on any engine.

In Marin County we were all reminded of our dependency on electric power and devised ways to get our critical work done without it, though it got harder as the days went by. This recent event is a timely reminder to think about how much we depend on water and sewer services. You've probably thought about how many days you could live in your home without access to water. Have you thought about the same scenario without access to your sewer? You can stock up on water to a point, but you can't stock up on access to your sewer. Hence making backup power available during events such as this is a way of life for RVSD.
